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### **Helping Fearful Clients**

- Check in regularly with the expectant mom about her stress level.
- Ask her to rate it on a scale of 1-10, with 1 being low and 10 being high.
  It may take time for her to truly be able to sort out all the stressors in her life right now!



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- When a pregnant woman is depressed, she is more likely to use alcohol, tobacco, or other harmful substances.
- She may also be less likely to comply with prenatal advice especially if visits are abbreviated or "virtual".
- Help the expectant mom understand the interaction of these factors.

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### Prenatal Care

- During this time, the prenatal care schedule and recommendations have not changed.
- ACOG has released guidelines to providers on having visits virtually.

 Privacy issues, care, and quality are rights during this time, and we want women to receive all the tests and care they need to have a healthy baby.



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- Many have called for testing of pregnant women to be a priority but that remains uncertain.
- Women can expect to have their temperature taken at regular appointments.
